"Sustained action to improve the NHS response to the violence and abuse experienced by women and children is necessary and possible, and should start at all levels of the NHS today" (Prof. Sir George Alberti 2010).

This conference looks at the evidence for effective interventions in healthcare and will help organisations respond to Professor Alberti's call for action in the Report of the Task Force on Health Aspects of Violence against Women and Children published earlier this year.

- Manchester's Strategy to prevent and respond to domestic abuse
